BACKGROUND OF THE STUDY

The story is told through an unsympathetic narrator, yet the book is utterly clear about what its moral heart is. This is a terribly difficult thing for the writer to do.'

As Laurence Perrine mentions, 'the technical term protagonist is preferable to the popular term "hero" because it is less ambiguous. The protagonist is simply the central character, the sympathetic or repulsive' (1974:44)

In my thesis, I would like to present the portrayal of the protagonist, who is also the narrator, namely Manon Gaudet.

'Manon Gaudet is one unhappy woman. She is pretty, bitterly intelligent, and monstrously self-absorbed, who seethes under the dominion of her boorish husband... She experiences alterations based on the betrayal of her husband, and the

black people as property in Pre-Civil War Era. As Ronald L. F. Davis, Ph. D in

his Slavery in America: A Historical Overview told that

American slavery was a brutal system based upon physical force, threats, torture, sexual exploitation and intimidation. Any black resisting overly the orders of a slaveholder or almost any white in the community could expect immediately and often brutal retaliation. - 2. What is the cause of the changes experienced by the protagonist?

PURPOSE OF THE STUDY

This study is carried out in order:

- To show how the author portrays the protagonist in Valerie Martine's <u>Property</u>.
- 2. To show the author's purpose in creating a protagonist.

METHODS OF RESEARCH

I use library research in writing the thesis. Firstly, I read the novel. Secondly, I choose the prominent literary aspect of the novel to be analysed. Thirdly, I search for the references from the library and the Internet, which can support the analysis and furthermore can help me in writing the thesis. Finally, I draw some conclusion about what I have analyzed.
