Synopsis of <u>A Spot of Bother</u>

David's painful memory of his past makes him decide to hide the truth about Phoebe from Norah. David tells Norah that their baby girl died at birth. Actually, he has given away the baby girl to Caroline, together with the address of a home to which he wants her to be taken care of. However, Caroline decides to keep and raise Phoebe as her own child.

As Paul grows up, Norah and David are no longer close to each other. Norah, who always thinks of her daughter, takes a job that becomes an allconsuming career; she also looks for intimacy from other men that keeps her away from her own husband. Disappointed with his father, Paul finds release through music. David, feeling guilty of keeping a secret, looks for solace through the lens of his camera, the "Memory Keeper," to make his life meaningful through the images he captures.
